From the Pastor's Desk



Your Service Ministry

The 2014 Annual Report of our church is now printed and available, for those who have not yet picked up a copy. The Annual Report provides a snapshot of one year in the life of our church. This year's edition provides a remarkable view of the activity of White Rock Presbyterian Church during the year just passed. For all of you who wrote a report of your particular ministry for the report, thank you. There are some very gifted writers among our saints.

I was particularly struck by Rod McCabe's report on the work of the Service Ministry of our church last year. It became clear to me that in the process of carrying out this ministry, oriented toward those outside the walls of our buildings, we lose track of all that God is doing through us. In this month's column from the pastor I would like to briefly summarize what Rod provided for the Annual Report. Here are some of the more significant Service Ministry accomplishments of 2014—what the Holy Spirit was doing in and through you last year.

- ✿ The Rummage Sale, which garnered \$2,700 for LA Cares, the Women's Crisis Center of Northern New Mexico, and the Navajo House of Fellowship

- ✿ House construction by a group (October 11-12) and by individuals on the Navajo Reservation near Gallup
- ✿ Firewood deliveries, quilt deliveries, tool lending, and Christmas boxes for Navajo friends
- ✿ Scholarship support through the Julie's Helpers Fund for young Navajo women attending college
- ✿ Strengthening the bonds of Christian love and community through all of these exchanges with Navajo sisters and brothers
- ✿ Operation Christmas Child 2014, which yielded more than 220 boxes of toiletry items, school supplies, clothing, and toys for children in need overseas
- ✿ Financial support for various local, regional, national, and international ministries: mission support for the Presbyterian Church (USA), the PCUSA One Great Hour of Sharing and Christmas Joy offerings, Leith and Carol Fujii in Thailand, John and Jenny Heaton in Tajikistan, the Café Justo coffee ministry, regional PCUSA ministries like the Jicarita Cluster, Young Life Los Alamos, LA Cares, and others

You will find more details on all of these efforts in the 2014 Annual Report, Service Ministry section. We are not a large church, but God is doing some astounding things through us as we carry out ministries of care and compassion in Christ's name.


The women are planning to package Easter cookies made for the Crisis Center.

Ecumenical Lenten Series

For a number of years several Los Alamos churches have joined together during the season of Lent to offer weekly gatherings for food, spiritual growth, and worship. The tradition continues in 2015, and the sponsoring churches are eager to include White Rock Presbyterian Church. Other participating churches include Bethlehem Lutheran, First United Methodist, Trinity on the Hill Episcopal, and The United Church.

The Lenten gatherings will happen every Thursday evening from February 26 through March 26, meeting at Bethlehem Lutheran Church. Each evening consists of a simple soup and bread supper, a number of classes offering growth in discipleship, and worship. Dinner begins at 6:00 PM and worship ends about 8:00 PM. You are welcome to come for any or all of the evening events. Each week is independent, so you may come for as many Thursday evenings as your schedule allows.

This year the theme of the Lenten series is "Building the Beloved Community," focusing on God's love for us in Christ, and our mutual love for each other in Christ. I encourage you to participate in this unique opportunity for fellowship, study, and worship with Christian brothers and sisters from several churches during the Season of Lent. Treasury Notes

If I had to pick one attribute to describe our church life in 2014, it would be the generosity of giving of time and of money. For those interested in statistics, the average financial giving has been significantly increasing over the last few years. In 2013 the average pledge was \$4,444, in 2014 it was \$5,015, and for 2015 it will be \$5,282. This increase in pledging is amazing in itself, given our small pool of givers. But the astounding figure to me is the second-mile giving in 2014. We received \$60,271 from more than 27 giving units for our non-budget Designated Fund accounts, such as Buildings & Grounds, Carpet, Furnishings, Julie's Helpers, One Great Hour of Sharing Offering, Christmas Joy Offering, Navajo Mission, the Rummage Sale, and other fund accounts. The majority of this second-mile giving was from those who already regularly gave to the church for general operating costs.

One of my favorite Bible verses is from Matthew 6:21, "*For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.*" This has been cited as the biblical basis for the

inseparable connection between our spiritual lives and how we handle money. The increase in financial giving at WRPC, coupled with the increase of time volunteering in church projects, events, and mission in 2014 might indicate a spiritual transformation at work in our lives. It certainly indicates a willingness to support the efforts of our new pastor toward revitalization of our church and growth of our congregation.

Meet Eric and Becky Hinderliter

Eric and Becky are Mission co-workers in Lithuania where they have been serving at the Lithuanian Christian Church (LCC) International University in Klaipėda, Lithuania since 2001.



LCC was founded by Lithuanian Christians, Canadian, and US foundations as an English language institute in the wake the collapse of communism in Eastern Europe.

Today LCC is a fully accredited liberal arts school with a distinct Christian emphasis. It seeks to prepare students for leadership in the post-Soviet region. For its first 10 years LCC served primarily Lithuania. Starting in 2004, LCC broadened its reach to post-Soviet countries to the east. About half the students now come from Albania, Belarus, Kazakhstan, Latvia, Moldova, Russia, and Ukraine. At LCC, Eric teaches economics, sociology, and theology. Becky teaches accounting.

Unlike most mission assignments that focus on a specific ethnic group or a specific country, LCC is international. Seven languages are spoken in LCC, with Russian as the first language. The students' faith backgrounds are also diverse. Students from Lithuania and western Ukraine tend to be Catholic, while those from Russia and Belarus are mostly Orthodox. The faculty comes from Lithuania, Latvia, Canada, the United States, and several other countries. With the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, the door opened for Christian missions in this formerly closed region. Enjoying that openness, LCC strives to strengthen civil society and the church. The formerly Soviet countries all instituted market economies, although there is now some movement toward more authoritarian, state-controlled economies. The gap between the rich and poor has widened dramatically since 1991. Ethnic and nationalist tensions, repressed in the Soviet times, have exploded. The newly independent states need ethical leaders who understand how to develop democratic political traditions and foster the rebirth of civil society. Further, the church needs faithful, biblically grounded leaders with a concern for reconciliation, tolerance, and social justice, and LCC seeks to help fill these needs. Not all LCC students are Christians, so LCC strives to help them experience what a faithful Christian life might be like. They are invited to

consider the call to faith and to examine their own worldviews in light of the gospel.

Eric and Becky Hinderliter seek to teach through their words and their actions. "We hope we teach more than the subjects from the college catalog," Becky says. "We hope our students catch something more, something about how to live a life one values, how one relates to others, and how one contributes to the common good." Eric notes, "We also hope that students get a glimpse of what the Christian life might look like. We hope we teach the truth."

Eric and Becky focus on building relationships as a key part of the teaching and learning process. Their students often ask them how long they plan to stay at LCC. "They are really asking, 'Are you going to be here long enough to make a worthwhile relationship possible?'" Becky says, "Students long for authentic relationships with authentic and trustworthy adults."

The Hinderliters say they have been blessed by the visits from U.S. Presbyterians who have come to Lithuania to teach, to work, and to visit with them in Klaipėda. They also enjoy visits from former students who share their stories of marriage and family, job success, and church involvement. Their students often credit their LCC education with shaping their values and helping them discern their vocations.

Prior to their mission service Eric served in leadership roles for several nonprofits and local governments, and Becky was an administrator in a state agency in Pennsylvania. They are members of Pine Street Presbyterian Church in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. There they discerned a call into cross-cultural service. A visit to the South India Institute for Advanced Christian Studies in Bangalore in 2000 confirmed their sense of call to mission service as teachers. While visiting the school, they were struck by the words of Psalm 118:23 that were carved on a large stone at the school's entrance: "This is the Lord's doing; it is marvelous in our eyes." This verse continues to be a watchword of their life and ministry.

The Hinderliters bring to LCC academic credentials that serve their students well and that help LCC maintain accreditation. Eric earned a bachelor's degree at Allegheny College in Pennsylvania, and master's and doctoral degrees from Brown University. He earned a master's degree in faith-based development from Eastern College. Becky received a bachelor's degree and an M.B.A. from Lebanon Valley College in Pennsylvania.
