## From the Pastor's Desk



### The Ministry of Members

The Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church (USA), a part of our constitution, has a section entitled, "The Ministry of Members," which reminds all of us of at least some of the components of faithful membership in our Presbyterian churches, but more importantly, as members of the one, holy, catholic (universal) church. Here is the content of that section:

Membership in the Church of Jesus Christ is a joy and a privilege. It is also a commitment to participate in Christ's mission. A faithful member bears witness to God's love and grace and promises to be involved responsibly in the ministry of Christ's Church. Such involvement includes:

- proclaiming the good news in word and deed,
- taking part in the common life and worship of a congregation,
- lifting one another up in prayer, mutual concern, and active support,
- studying Scripture and the issues of Christian faith and life,
- supporting the ministry of the church through the giving of money, time, and talents,

- demonstrating a new quality of life within and through the church,
- responding to God's activity in the world through service to others,
- living responsibly in the personal, family, vocational, political, cultural, and social relationships of life,
- working in the world for peace, justice, freedom, and human fulfillment,
- participating in the governing responsibilities of the church, and
- reviewing and evaluating regularly the integrity of one's membership, and considering ways in which one's participation in the worship and service of the church may be increased and made more meaningful.

I would be the first to confirm that this list is a bit daunting. How many of us can do all of these things faithfully and well?! The good news is, of course, that God's grace applies to us in our efforts to carry out the ministry of members, too. We are not expected to fully and perfectly perform all of these activities and functions, but they serve (much like the Ten Commandments) as a reminder of what faithful response to God's grace looks like.

God's blessings and peace to you during this Lenten season, as we all review and pray over our faithful response to the grace of God in Christ, the Anointed One, who suffered for each of us, and for all of us together.

## Session News

At the January and February Session meetings our focus topics gave special attention to the ministries of Equipping, Service, and Support, affording an opportunity for the Session to review the current state and direction of each Ministry.

Elder Joyce Haven described the current Sunday morning program for our younger worshipers, which is a major part of the Equipping Ministry. The first Sunday includes an in-service message from Joyce, the second and fourth Sundays a lesson outside the service, and the third Sunday an in-service message from Pastor Guthrie. This seems to be working well, although the highly variable number and ages of young folks attending presents some planning challenges. Joyce expressed a concern about having qualified adults available to staff the nursery. This need is unpredictable but it's important to meet the need, especially when we have visitors with very small children.

Elder Rod McCabe highlighted the long-range goal to have 10-15 percent of WRPC's annual budgeted income spent on Service Ministry efforts. Typically 40-50 percent of that spending has been unified giving through the PC(USA). This budgeted Service spending is supplemented by fund-raising efforts. Rummage sales have been a key part of this fund-raising and will likely be so in the future. We were again reminded that many of WRPC's most successful Service efforts have originated with an individual or two in the congregation who saw a possibility and championed it. ARTA, Love for Life, Operation Christmas Child, and House of Fellowship are good

examples. The New Beginnings process has lead us to seek a local mission that will catalyze new WRPC growth through new service in the community. So far we haven't found that mission.

Elder Terry Buxton addressed the Support Ministry and noted that a long range plan for facilities and other support elements really requires a long range plan for increasing our numbers and participation—without more people the facility really becomes secondary. That said, we have implemented a number of facility improvements in the past year to enhance the first impression that visitors receive. In addition the Session has identified numerous options for further facility improvement and is working to develop a rational plan for making those changes at the right times.

- The initiation of ministry and programs to promote the continuing spiritual development of ruling elders and the membership at large;
- Continuing efforts to raise the visibility of WRPC in our community and new efforts at evangelism in the community;
- The initiation of conversations with other churches in our community in order to develop ecumenical mission projects for the future.

Please pray for the Session as it considers these recommendations. More information will be forthcoming soon.

## Lenten Visual Meditations

During this season of Lent, we will offer a series of silent, pre-service visual meditations to provide a time for prayer and meditation prior to Sunday Worship. The Gospel lessons from the Common Lectionary for this year are drawn primarily from the Gospel According to Mark, supplemented by readings from the Gospel According to John. The image of the “Son of Man” features prominently in the Lenten readings from both gospels—and is the theme for our visual meditations.

Jesus refers to himself much more frequently as the Son of Man than he does as the Son of God, and this is especially true in these Lenten readings. At one level the two terms, taken together, highlight the (sometimes puzzling) doctrine of Jesus as wholly and completely divine, and simultaneously wholly and completely human. Another usage of Son of Man is an eschatological one referring to one who comes in end-times to rule and/or judge the world and all the world’s people.

We opened the Lenten visual meditations with a painting by Botticelli, from the Sistine Chapel, depicting (in the background) the three temptations of a very human Christ, in the desert, who responds with super-human clarity and certainty to Satan’s offers and promises. For the second Sunday of Lent we will return to Michelangelo’s “Last Judgment,” which we also encountered on the first Sunday of Advent, exploring the eschatological meaning of the term. In subsequent Sundays we will explore the Son of Man as seen through the eyes of yet other classic artists.



## Meet Dennis and Maribel Smith



Dennis and Maribel began a new chapter of ministry in South America in January 2011. Dennis is the regional liaison for the Southern Cone and Brazil. (The Southern Cone of South America includes Argentina,

Chile, Uruguay and Paraguay.) They previously served in Guatemala. Maribel serves in ministry in the home and continues her volunteer work as part of a network that treats post-traumatic stress and seeks alternatives to violence.

From their home in Buenos Aires, Argentina, Dennis and Maribel continue to practice the gift of hospitality that so enriched their lives in Guatemala. "Our home is known as the Hotel Smith Pérez," comments Maribel. "Over the decades we've had the privilege of welcoming hundreds of people into our home—especially young people. Helping guests discover how and where God is present in our homeland has been a special gift. Now, in Argentina, we hope to join our guests in discovering a new world."

As regional liaison, Dennis has three main responsibilities: developing the PC(USA)'s relationship with its historic mission partners, accompanying (supervising) PC(USA) mission co-workers in the area, and providing resources and advice to presbyteries and congregations that have mission partnerships in Brazil and the Southern Cone. "The PC(USA) has been engaged in mission in this region for over 150 years," Dennis says. "We have more than a dozen mission partners who have strong and vibrant ministries. Their priorities include evangelism, promoting social justice—especially for the impoverished and the sinned against—and excellence in graduate-level theological education. I am grateful that through my work in the World Association for Christian Communication (WACC) I already know many women and men now in positions of leadership with our partner churches and ecumenical institutions. They are valued friends and respected colleagues."

Dennis and Maribel have 33 years of mission service in Central America, and so many stories to share of how God is at work in our world. Yet, they say, there is so much more to learn. "I witnessed how God's people reach out to each other in difficult times", says Dennis. Guatemala has offered the world stories of faith, stories of the resilience born of hope in the God of Life. This is one of the great gifts that our Central American mission partners offer Presbyterians in the United States."

Born in St. Louis, Missouri, Dennis was an honor graduate in speech communications at Wheaton College in Illinois and subsequently completed a one-year graduate fellowship at the National College of Education in Evanston, Illinois. The following year his new home church, First Presbyterian in Evanston, sponsored him on a one-year volunteer assignment as a communication consultant to the National Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Guatemala.

Following this volunteer year, Dennis returned to Chicago and worked for two years in the private sector. His desire to continue working in communication with the Guatemalan Presbyterian Church led him to accept a five-year assignment with the United Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) beginning in October 1977. His duties included religious film distribution and workshops on radio, drama, journalism and interpersonal communication. He also taught communication at the Presbyterian Seminary in Guatemala.

In July 1984 Dennis received a new appointment at the request of the Latin American Evangelical Center for Pastoral Studies (CELEP), based in San José, Costa Rica. From Guatemala, he coordinated CELEP's Education for Communication program. In addition to communication training, Dennis joined other Latin American colleagues in social research on the conversation among media, religion and culture. In 1996 CELEP devolved into its regional offices and Dennis' work came under the umbrella of the Central American Evangelical Center for Pastoral Studies (CEDEPCA), where he served until 2010. In 2008 Dennis was elected president of the WACC.

Maribel was educated in Guatemala and received training as a bilingual secretary at the National Secretarial School in Guatemala. A Roman Catholic, in 1983 she began to minister in her neighborhood with a congregation of Italian nuns. Together they discerned her gifts for ministry and her commitment to her community. She was trained as a lay pastoral agent and worked with base ecclesial communities in her neighborhood. In 1987 Maribel began working on the publications team of the Centro de Estudios, Publicaciones y Servicios de Evangelización (CEPSE), an educational resource center for base communities. In 1989 Maribel and Dennis were married and Maribel was appointed as a mission co-worker of the Presbyterian Church. In 2004 Maribel began to be mentored in holistic therapies designed to help people manage stress and seek wholeness by Karen Woehler, a PC(USA) commissioned lay pastor and retired nurse from Minnesota.

The Smith family are members of the San Juan Apóstol Evangelical Church in Guatemala City, where Dennis was ordained to the office of elder and Maribel to the office of deacon. Dennis and Maribel have two sons, Lucas and Benjamin.
